**In 2019-2020 when we begin celebrating Confirmation & Holy Communion in 3rd grade, note that both of these Sacraments will be celebrated at the same Mass by the Bishop or his delegate.*



Why is the Bishop changing the order and the age?

The natural sequence of the Sacraments of Christian Initiation through the history of the Church has been Baptism, Confirmation and then First Eucharist. This is seen at the Easter Vigil when people enter the full communion of the Church. During the first five hundred years or so of the history of the Catholic Church it was always the case that the Sacraments of Initiation were celebrated in this order, and it was almost always the case that all three sacraments were celebrated together at the same time, even with infants.

Later the Roman Catholic Church adopted the practice of waiting until the age of reason for the reception of Confirmation and First Eucharist, but they were still received in that order. However, the “age of reason” was not clearly defined and different bishops and priests interpreted it in different ways. Typically the Sacraments were received together when a child was in their early adolescence. In the early 1900’s Pope St. Pius X defined the age of reason to be 7 years old. The assumption was that as First Eucharist was moved earlier, Confirmation would follow as well. However, most dioceses moved the age of First Eucharist younger and left Confirmation in early adolescence, which is what we have known for most of the last century, but is not the order that the majority of the history of the Church has known. Since Vatican Council II, there have been many documents and decrees from Rome that support and encourage restoring the order.

I still don’t understand. Where can I go to learn more?

Is every Catholic Church doing this, or just St. Vincent’s?

Every Catholic Church in the Archdiocese of Denver is implementing the Restored Order of Sacraments. There is a window for implementation, with all parishes fully implemented by 2020.

If I don’t feel like my child is ready, can I wait to enroll them to receive the Sacraments?

Yes! You are the primary educator of your child and we will honor your wishes. Please note though that by delaying Confirmation, First Holy Communion will also be delayed. Per Archbishop Aquila, there will not be an alternate path to which children are able to receive First Communion before Confirmation.

What is the preparation like?

Every child who will receive a Sacrament at St. Vincent’s needs to be enrolled in Sacramental classes at the Parish. For 2017-2018, 2nd graders will enroll for First Reconciliation & First Holy Communion. Any 3rd grader or older child who hasn’t been Confirmed will register for Confirmation classes.

Beginning in 2018-2019, Sacrament Preparation will be a 2-year program. Year 1 will include classes to prepare for Reconciliation. The First Reconciliation ceremony will be celebrated during the Spring. These same families will return for Year 2, which will include preparation for Confirmation and First Communion. Both of these Sacraments will be received at a single Mass sometime during or shortly after the Easter season. The yearly class schedules and registrations will be released at the beginning of each school year. The classes will be about once a month, from October-June.

How do I sign my child up for this year’s Sacraments?

1. To register for Confirmation, go to saintvincents.org → “Sacraments” along the top → Find “Confirmation” → Register. Please register by September 26th.

2. To register for First Reconciliation & Holy Communion, go to saintvincents.org → “Sacraments” along the top → Find “First Reconciliation & Holy Communion” → Register. Please register by December 1st.
