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Junior Great Books

What do the *Declaration of Independence, Little Women, Proverbs*, and the *Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde* have in common? They are just a few titles of the 40 classics that students read in the entirety of the Junior Great Books program.

Junior Great Books is a 59-year-old extracurricular activity for high achieving readers in 5th-8th grade who are nominated by their teachers. Students are challenged to read outstanding books and discuss the significant ideas using the Socratic method of questioning. The aim is to help students learn to think clearly and logically, to communicate ideas effectively and listen with understanding and tolerance.

Between September and March, our SVDP students read 10 challenging books in their free time and met every other Monday evening with students from Christ the King and Good Shepherd. This year, St. Vincent de Paul represented the largest group participating at about 50 students in 5th-8th grade!

A special congratulations is deserved for our 8th graders (pictured here) for completing 40 classics! We would also like to extend our gratitude to Bonnie Sutherland, who has led the St. Vincent de Paul JGB program for 15 years and we welcome Marie Dimelow as our new fearless leader! 3rd Graders Coming in Hot!

Spring is officially here! The flowers are starting to bloom; we are enjoying after school laughs at the upper playground, and a little something spicy is popping up in 3rd grade. At SVdP our teachers are always looking for innovative ways to teach their curriculum and what better way to study the life cycle of a plant than making a salsa garden. The 3rd graders began their culinary efforts by first spending time with Sister Dominic observing and planting the seeds. The seeds were separated in individual containers that the students were able to shake and inspect from all angles. They drew

pictures of what the seeds currently looked like and what the plants would like when they are fully grown. Each student helped plant 3 types of peppers, cilantro, and tomatoes into containers. The seeds were then transferred to the greenhouse and the students are eagerly waiting for their plants to grow. 3rd grade has enjoyed their visits to the greenhouse to take care of their plants and track the growth progress. They are counting down the days until they can collect their produce and use Sister Dominic's recipe to make a tasty salsa. Not only have the 3rd graders used the greenhouse to fully witness the life cycle of a plant, but Mrs. Donelson and Miss Lee will also incorporate teaching measurements when they make their salsa. This fun and interactive project has not only incorporated many learning opportunities for the students, but has allowed them to experience the joy of growing their own garden. H&S will be the first in line with a bag of chips for this salsa party!

Crusader Corner- Meet Mrs. Kovar

While Mrs. Kovar, our Resource Coordinator, is a new face to many of us, her first year in this position actually marks her return to SVdP. Years ago, Mrs. Kovar was not only a parishioner here, but also taught 5th grade. Outside of SVdP, Mrs. Kovar enjoys time with her husband Kelly, and her three children, Jake (21), Chiara (almost 18) and Caleb (turning 16 this month).
